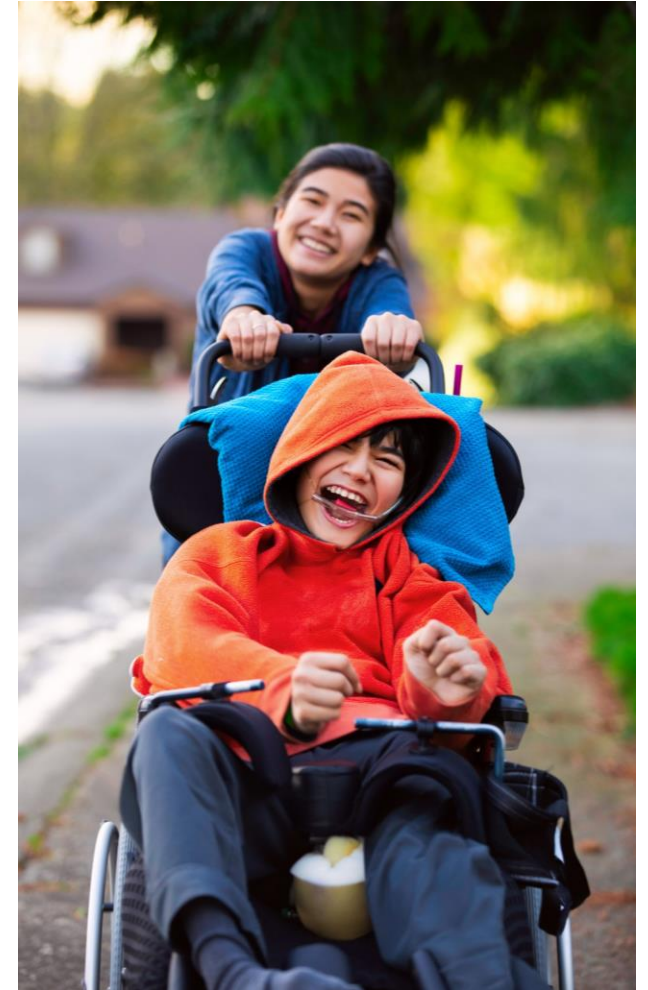

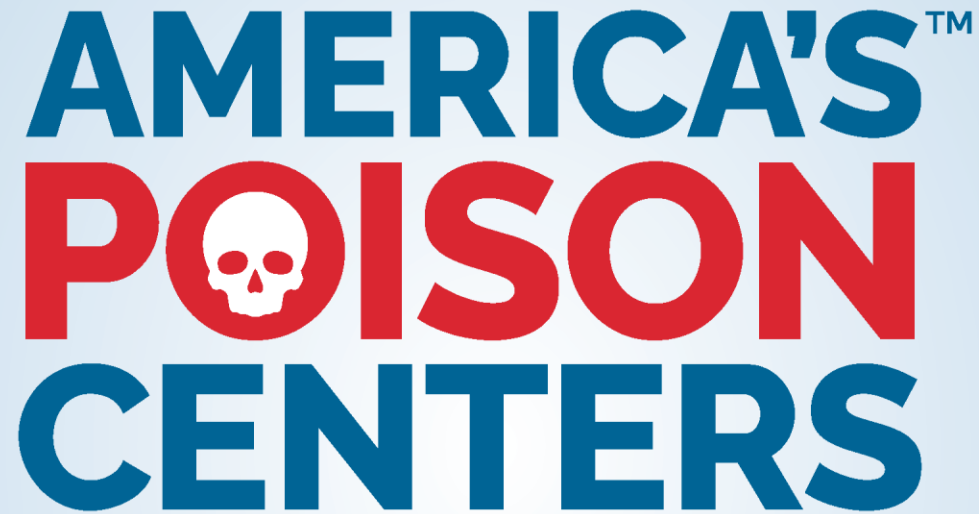

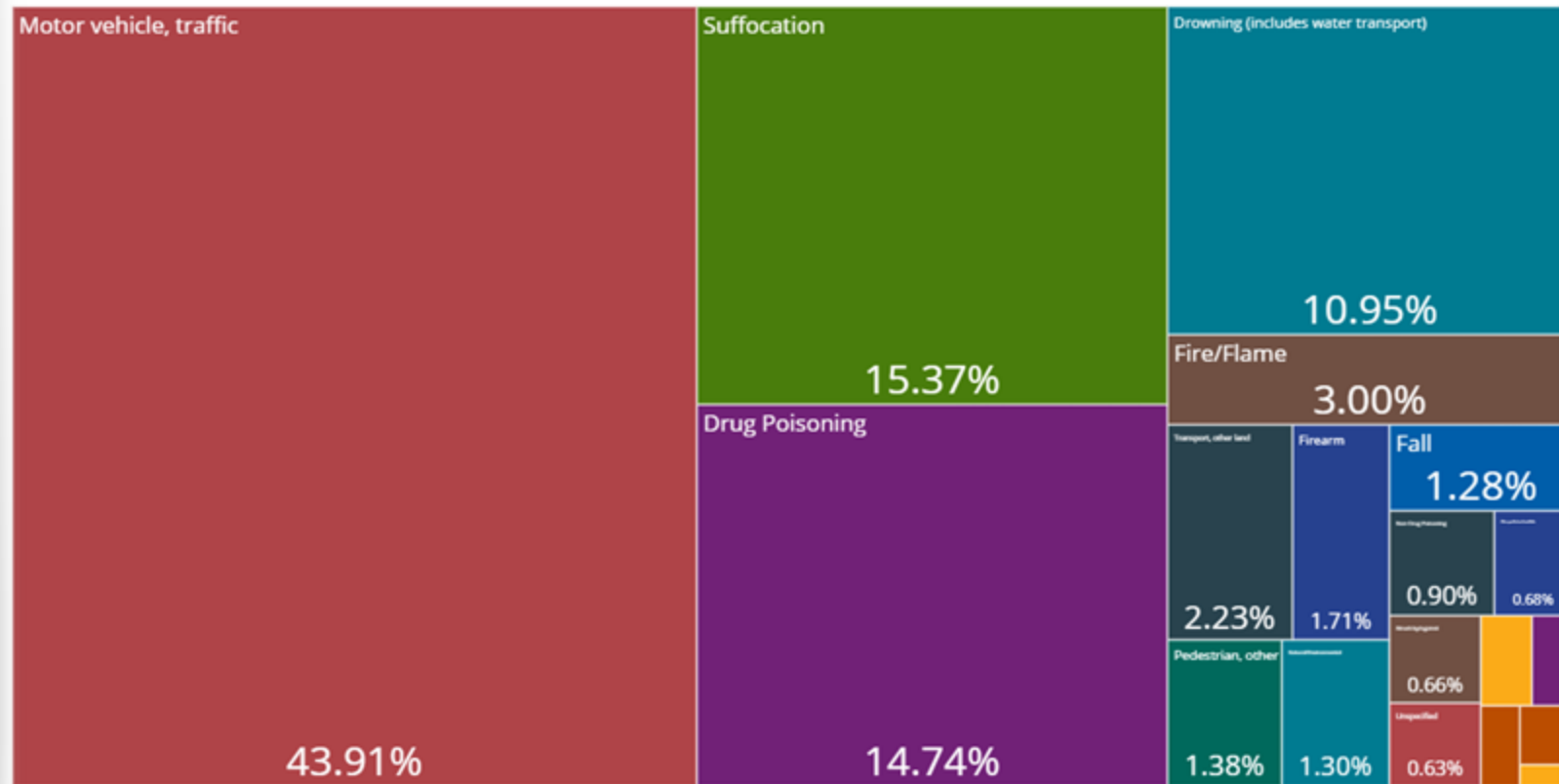

- 62,600 children treated for poisoning in the emergency department in 2021 (NEISS)
 - Increase from estimated 61,500 injuries in 2020

- 59 fatalities involving unintentional pediatric poisoning in 2021 (NCHS)
 - Children < 1 year had largest increase in death rate (7.29 deaths/million)

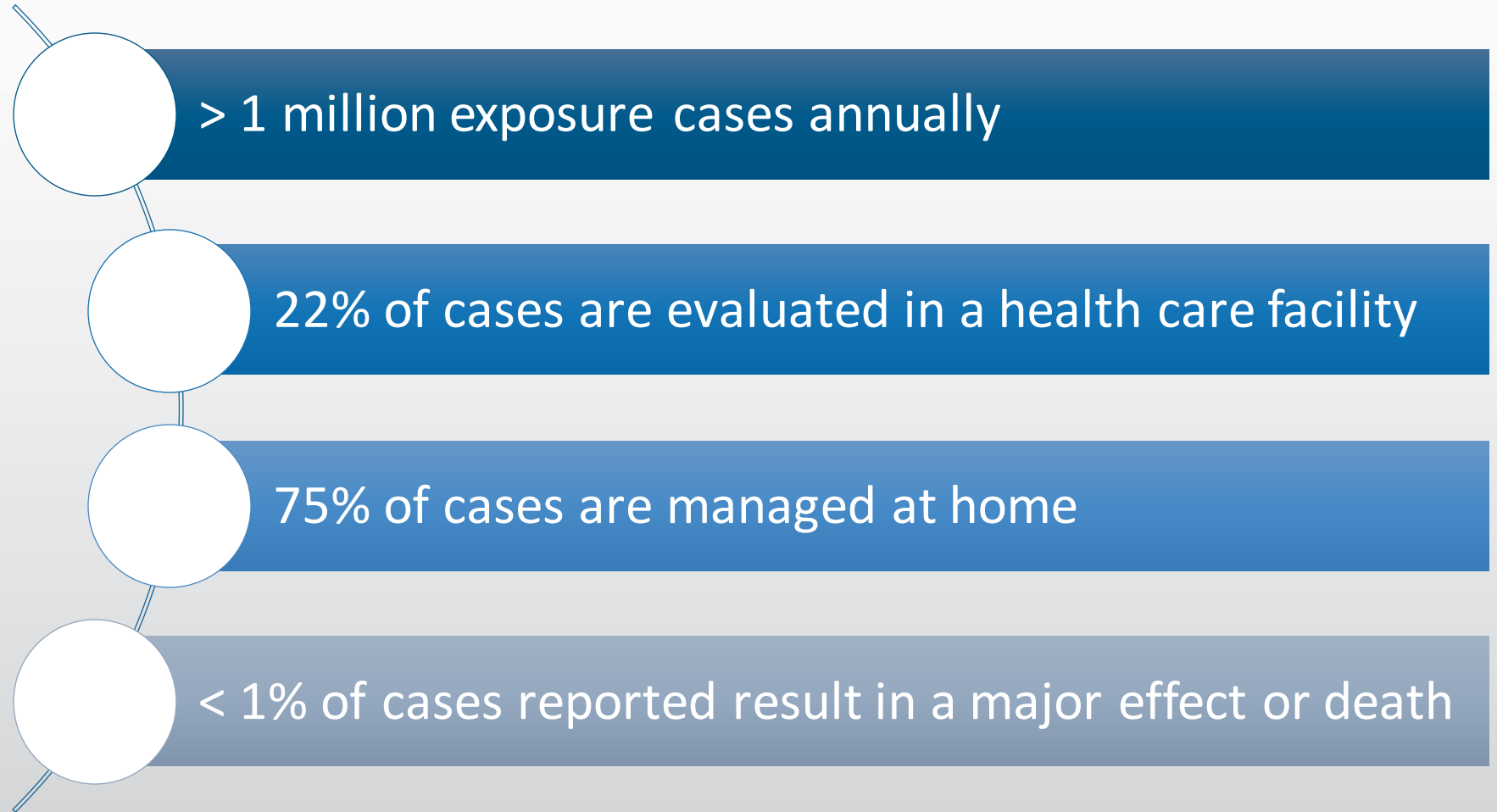

National Poison Data System

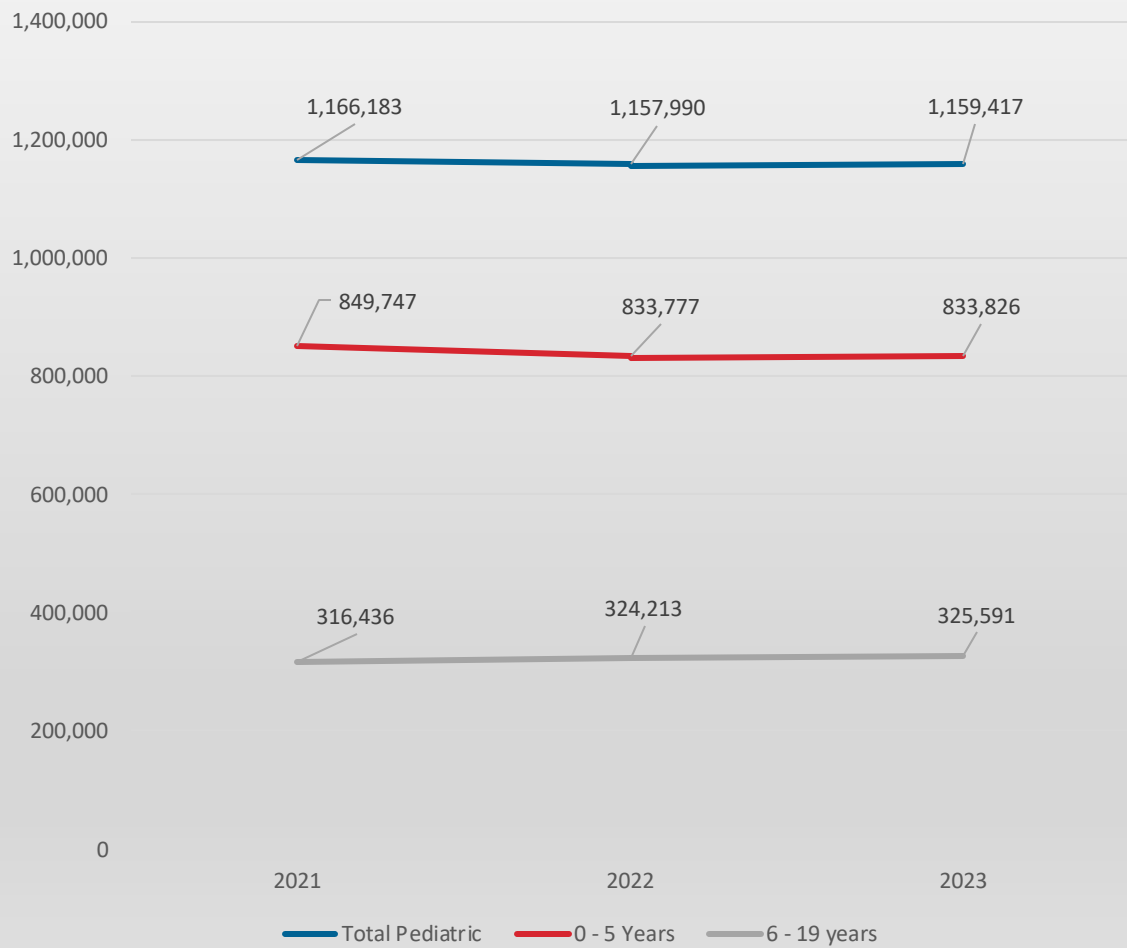
- Nationwide repository of exposure and information cases
 - Data from all 55 U.S. Poison Centers
 - 40 years of data collection
 - > 77 million case records
- Data automatically uploaded in near real-time (< 5 minutes)
- Standardized coded and defined data fields
- ~ 500,000 substances in NPDS product database

Pediatric Exposures Reported to U.S. Poison Centers

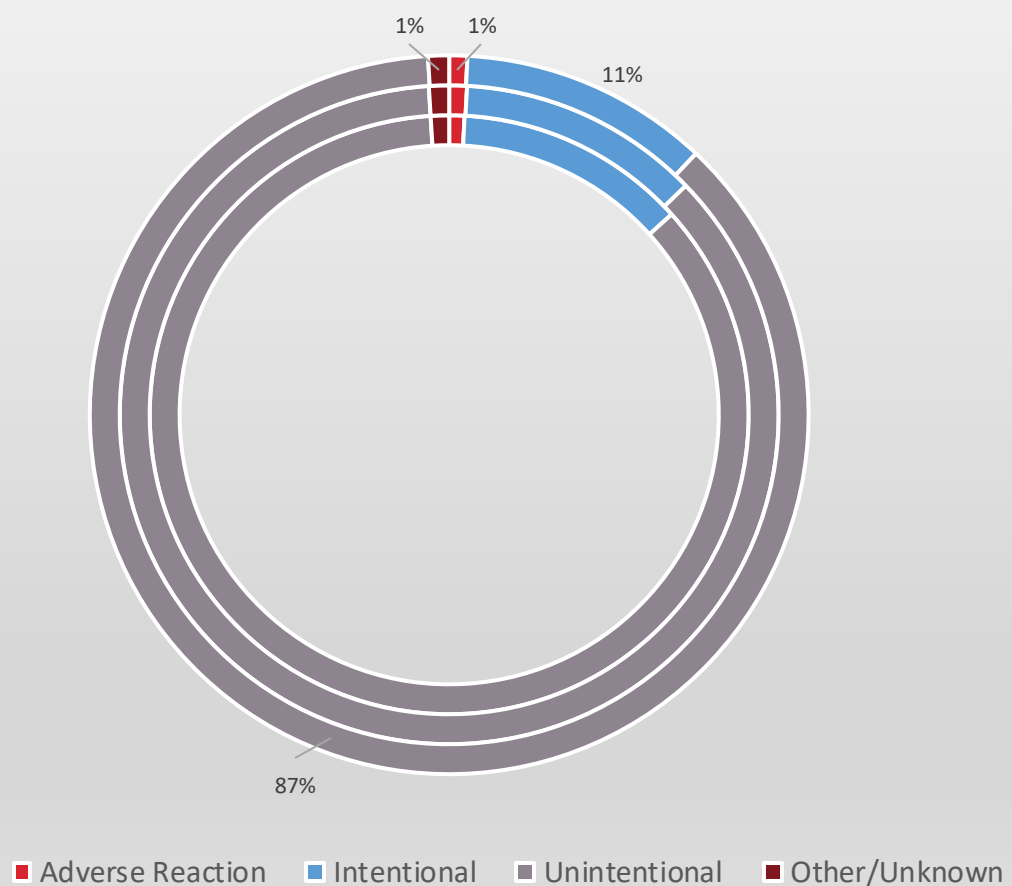


Total Pediatric Exposures Age 0 – 19 years

Pediatric Exposure Cases by Age Range, 2021 - 2023



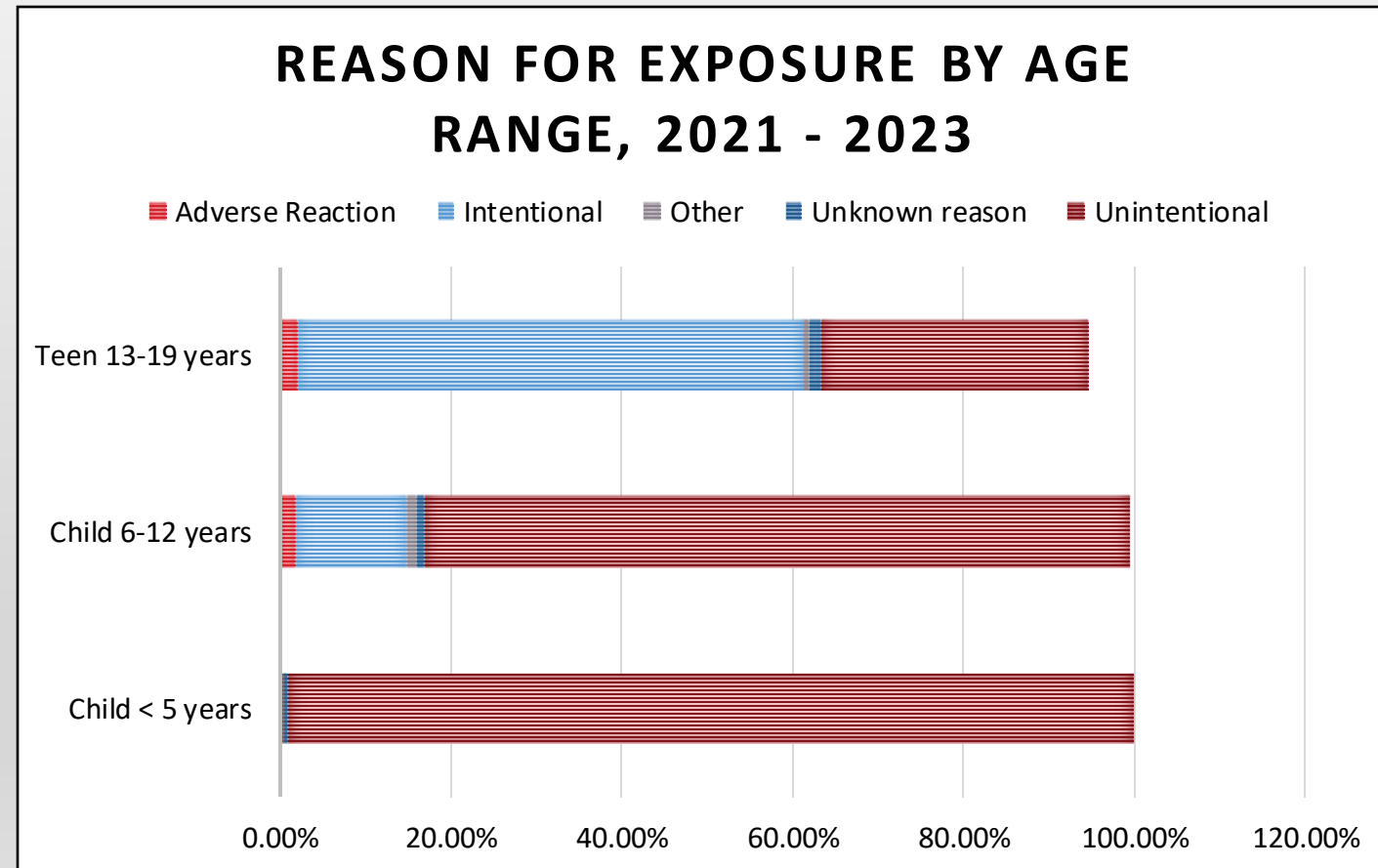

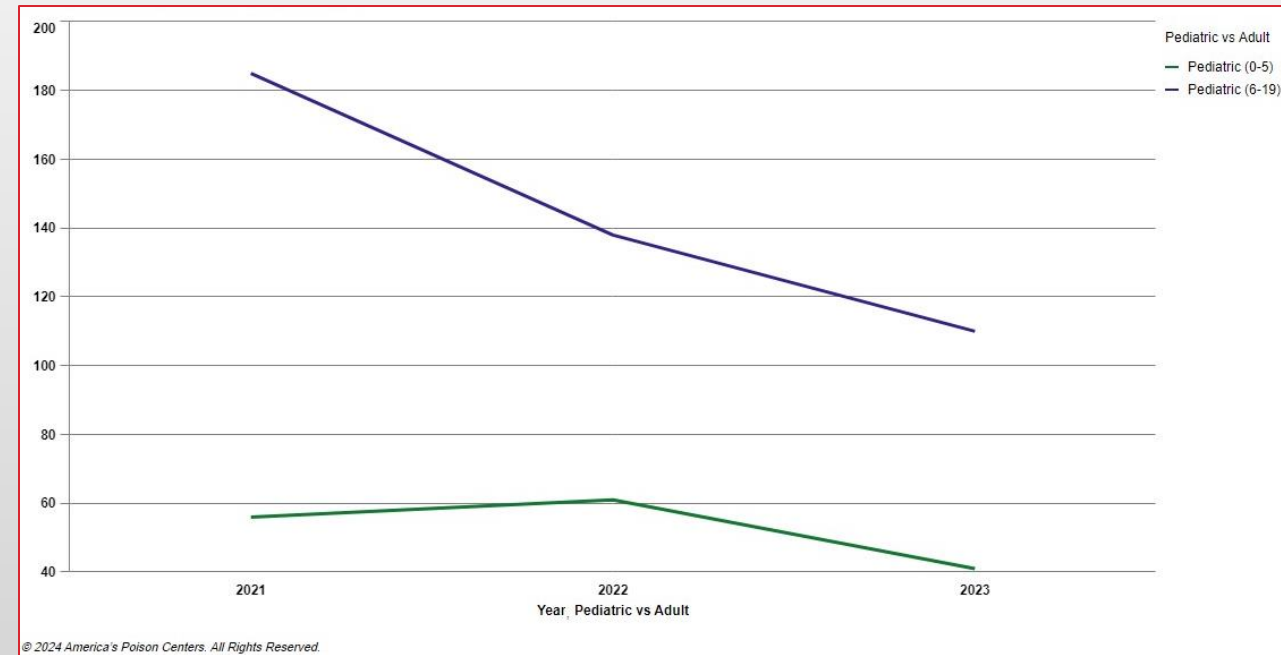

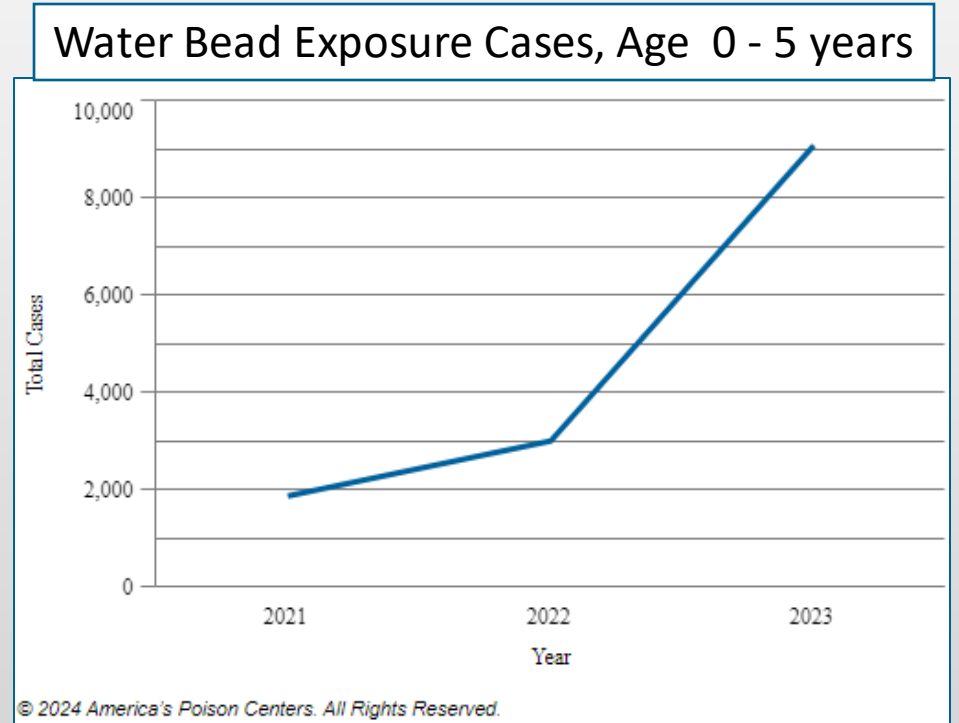

Trends in Top 10 Substance Categories Human Exposures, Age 0 – 5 years



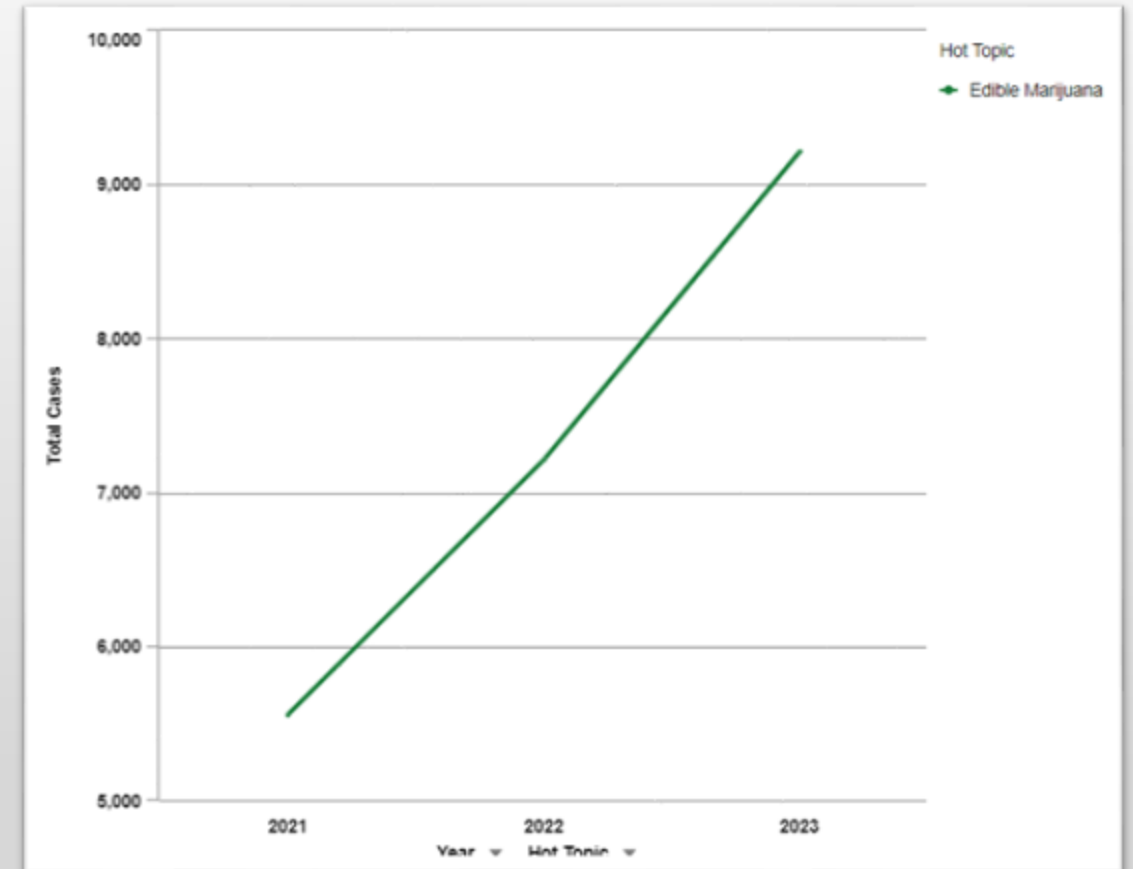
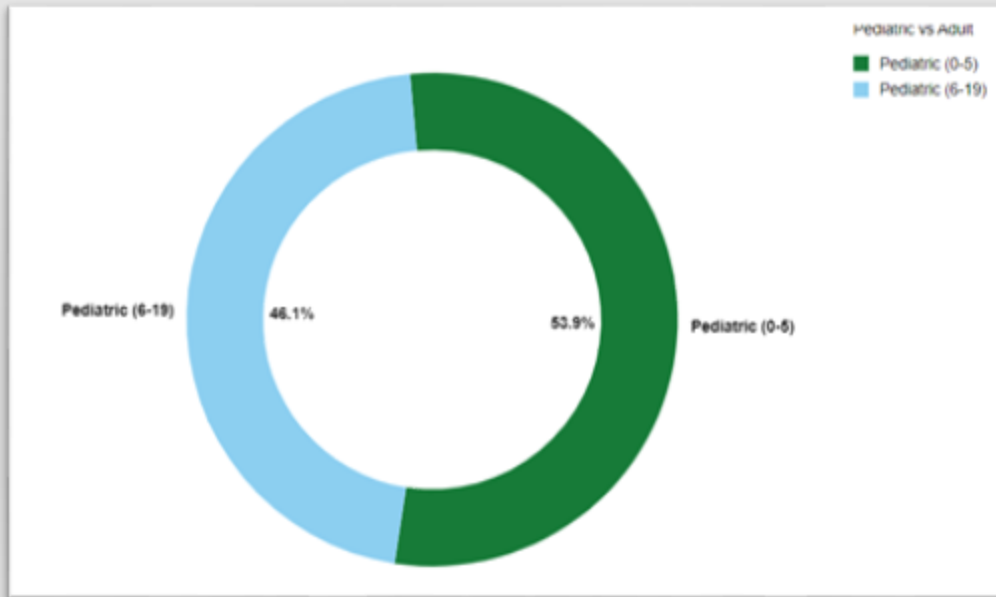
Water Bead Exposures Age 0 – 5 years

- Cases have increased 383% between 2021 and 2023
 - ~ 10% increase in cases evaluated at a health care facility
 - Severe effects of poisoning include life-threatening bowel obstructions requiring surgical intervention



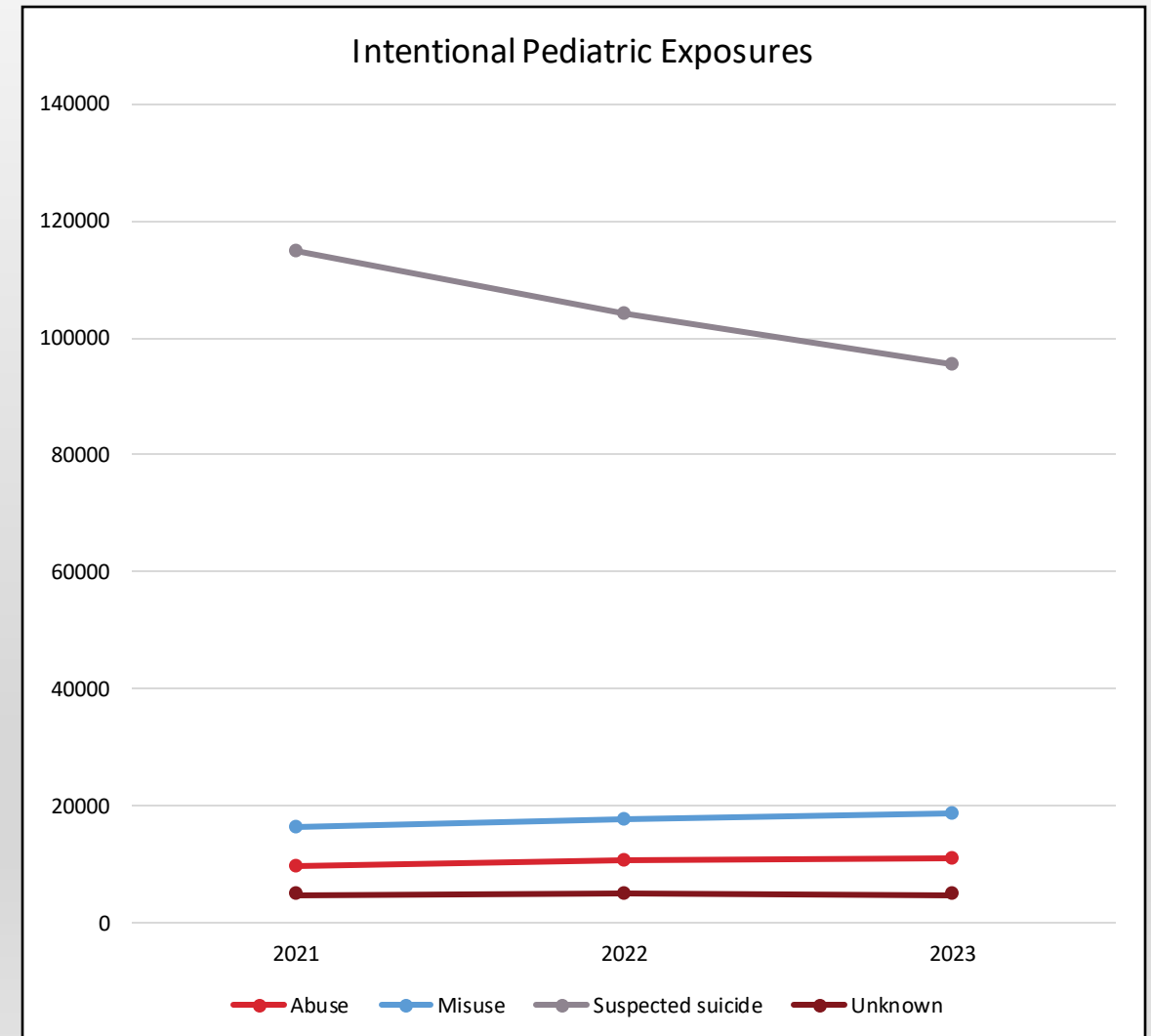
Edible Cannabis Exposures Age 0 – 19

- 65% increase in cases between 2021 and 2023
- > 80% of patients are managed in a healthcare facility



Intentional Exposure Trends

- Reports of self-harm cases decreased by nearly 20,000 cases
- Increases in both substance misuse and abuse cases

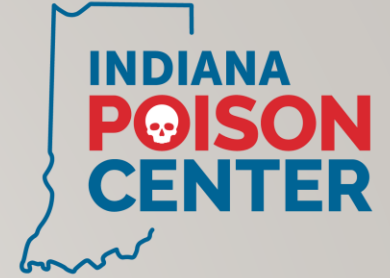
ADOLESCENT EXPOSURES IN INDIANA 2018-2023



INTENTIONAL EXPOSURES IN ADOLESCENTS AGES 10-19 (INDIANA)



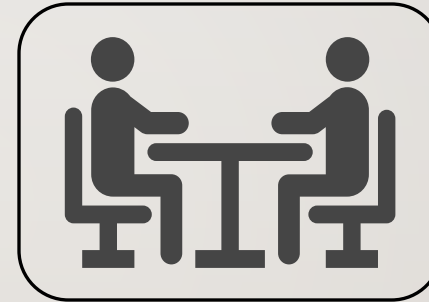

Know the dangers of winter delights. Bubble lights and snow globes can contain toxic liquids. Keep them up high, out of the reach of young children.

When the World is in Bloom Know What Poisons May Loom

Children to avoid grass or eating flowers, trees, or plants outdoors.

When using insect repellent, keep it away from the eyes and mouth. Remember to wash off bug spray once indoors.

Read and follow instructions when using lawn and garden chemicals. Before spraying, pick up children's and pets' toys, and wear protective gear.

Carbon Monoxide: YOU CAN'T SEE OR SMELL IT, BUT YOU CAN STOP IT.

WHAT IS CARBON MONOXIDE?
Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a gas with no color or smell. It can be dangerous to humans—even deadly. Any household appliance that burns fuel can produce dangerous amounts of CO if not used or maintained properly. If the item runs on batteries or electricity, you don't need to worry about CO poisoning.

CO SOURCES INCLUDE:

- Furnaces
- Portable generators
- Gas or charcoal grills
- Gas or propane stoves
- Motor vehicles and boats
- Heaters

PREVENT.

- Have fuel-burning appliances and heating systems checked each year by a professional. This includes hot water heater, furnaces, gas ranges, dryers, chimneys and fireplaces.
- Don't use generators inside your home or garage, even if windows are open. Keep generators more than 20 feet away from the home.
- Don't heat your home with a gas stove or oven.
- Don't leave a motor vehicle running in an enclosed area.

DETECT.

- Install CO alarms on every floor of your home, especially near bedrooms.
- Always follow directions in the CO alarm manual.
- Check CO alarms regularly to make sure they're working.

PROTECT.

- If your CO alarm goes off, act right away. Gather your family, including pets, and go outside to fresh air.
- If someone has collapsed, had a seizure, has difficulty breathing, or cannot be awakened, call 911.
- If you have a CO exposure or have questions, call Poison Help: 1-800-222-1222.

KNOW THE SIGNS OF CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING.

Early symptoms of CO poisoning can look like the flu. They include:

- Headache
- Dizziness
- Nausea/vomiting

Later symptoms may include:

- Chest pain
- Confusion
- Passing out

Different Kind of Halloween Same Potential Poisons

Glow sticks are fun and bright—but don't let kids take a bite. The liquid inside can cause irritation if swallowed or splashed in eyes.

Stay cool. Use caution with dry ice. Wear gloves when touching dry ice. Avoid using it in an enclosed space, eating it, and do not use it in punch bowls or cups.

Be careful with cosmetics. Only use nontoxic face paints. Throw away makeup that has expired. Test on the skin before use.

Treat or...trick? Some medicine and drugs look like candy. Keep drugs, including marijuana edibles, out of reach to avoid mix-ups.

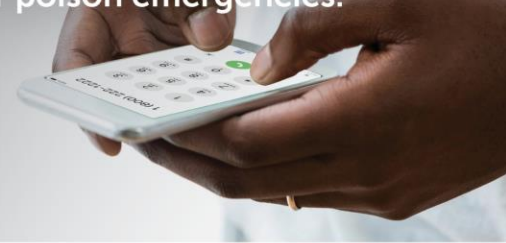

SUICIDE PREVENTION

Medication Disposal
The best way to get rid of expired or unused medicines. To find a disposal location near you, visit disposalback.com.

Drug disposal pouch
These pouches hold potent, addictive drugs in an environmentally friendly way while reducing the opportunity for abuse or misuse.

Household trashcan
Mix medicines with an undesirable substance, like kitty litter or used coffee grounds, and place this mixture into a sealed bag and throw it in the trash.

Flushing
Most medicines should be flushed down toilets. These drugs usually have instructions on the package that say they should be flushed as soon as they are no longer needed, or if a medication drop box, collection site or take-back event is not available.

If you have questions about your medicines, have made a medication mistake, or need more information on how to safely dispose of your medications, call your poison center at 1-800-222-1222.

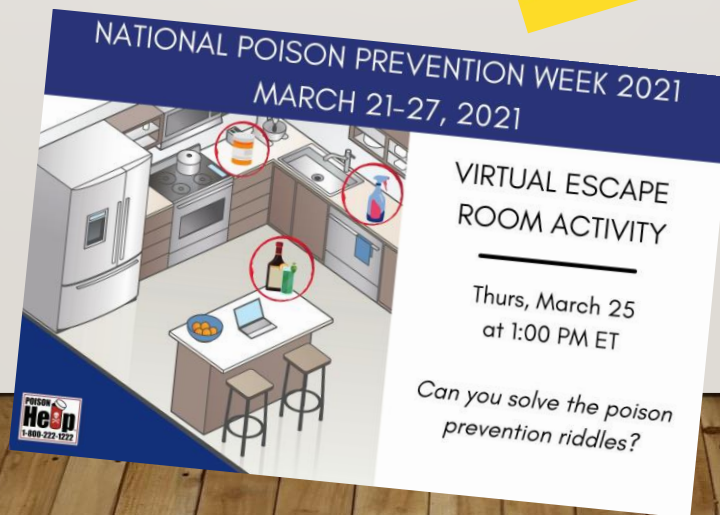
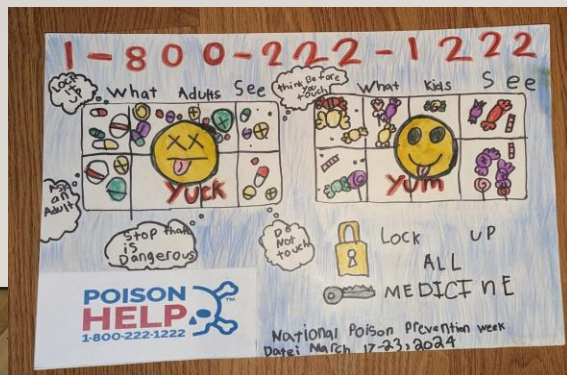


MAD LIB
