Motor Vehicle

Always use child safety seats. Proper installation is important.

Falls



Falling is part of learning.
Use safety gates and create fall safe environments.

There are many places in the home where children can get burned. Keep children away from matches.





Always place child on back in separate safety approved crib or bassinet.

Drowning



Young children love water. The best way to keep children safe is to watch them at all times.

Fire/Burn



Poisoning



Young children want to touch, taste and smell the things around them. Keep chemicals out of the reach of children.
